First of all the Austrian student union would like to welcome you in Austria!

The student union in Austria is called "Österreichische Hochschülerlnnenschaft". short "ÖH", and is managed voluntarily by students from all over the country. National Austrian law regulates our students' representation and the membership is compulsory at all higher education institutions. Thus, ÖH represents over 250.000 students in Austria, including exchange students that only spend one term/year in our country.

Students at universities of applied sciences called "Fachhochschulen" have also been represented by ÖH since

December 2007. At the moment we are focusing our energy on building up an excellent local representation and motivating younger students to pick up our work.

The student union law reauires that every member pays a membership fee of 16,86 Euro per semester. This law is also applicable to incoming students like you, so we kindly ask you to do so as well. Payment is organized by the university management, so please ask your respective international coordinator /department about the details of the procedure.

Your membership fee includes a liability and an accident insurance offered by Allianz Elementar Versicherung AG, covering almost all possible cases of accidents and damages during and around your university activities.

The Austrian student union is also offering an advisory service to students regarding legal, social and financial matters. For further information on services, please do not hesitate to contact us by mail.

Libraries

You might need a library for writing your papers, studying or solving case studies. Unfortunately the library in Krems is not that big so it is quite likely that you need books from Vienna as well. Here you get all the information you need concerning the two most important libraries for your studies.

Krems

The library is situated at the Campus. It is possible for IMC students to borrow up to five books for two weeks. All you need to bring is your IMC student ID. There is also a reading room and special study rooms with computers with internet where you can work on your tasks. A further possibi-

lity is the interlibrary loan (Fernleihe). With this service you can order almost any book from any Austrian and international library.

You may access this service online via the library homepage. The costs for the interlibrary loan service is from about 3.50 € per book to 9.00 €. The

loan period depends on the sending library and is from I up to 6 weeks.

Further information about loan period and sending costs you will receive at the library counter.

Vienna

A library rather close holding more books at your disposal is the WU (Wirtschaftsuniversität) library in the Vienna University of Economics and Business. This library is situated next to the train stop ..Wien Spittelau" which can be reached by direct train from Krems. To use the

PC work stations and borrow library material you will need a library card.

You can apply for such a library card at the circulation desk. You need to bring your IMC student ID (or a photo ID) AND your residence registration form (Meldezettel).

The library is closed on Saturdays, Sundays, bank holidays and Christmas. During holidays and Easter break the library has shortened opening hours.

Sports

Campus Sport offers about 40 different sport programs exclusively to students and staff members of the IMC Krems and the Danube University Krems.

The whole program is divided into eight different divisions:

- -Gymnastics
- -Relaxation
- -Ball Games
- -Outdoor
- -Dance
- -Water Sports
- -Family Sports
- -Martial Arts

Almost every course within the programs is supported by professional instructors. The places are limited and since the demand for the courses is increasing every semester it is

highly recommended to register as soon as possible. You can register with the application form at the office of Campus Sport during the office hours as long as there are vacancies.

The office is situated in the basement of the Danube University (middle wing L) on the campus. The prices for the course vary between 15€ and 60€ depending on the program. For some programs you need to pay extra charges for ren-

tals. If you take the "sport package" (3 courses) you get a discount of 10%.

You can find further information on the webpage of the Danube University under Service / Campus Sports. The webpage and all the information are available in English.





Transportation

The public transportation system in Austria is well organized and known for its reliability. The flip side of this is that many connections stop their service in the late evening hours. The prices are reasonable and the transportation network is well developed.

Cabs

Cabs or taxi's are rather expensive in Austria. If you get in a cab, you will be automatically charged a start fee. This fee varies in each city. Also the prices for the kilometer can be quite different, depending on the taxi company. In general it is a good advice to negotiate a fixed price before you start your journey with the cab.

Bus

The bus system in Austria is mostly designed for local transportation. Therefore buses are not that interesting for exchange students.

The train offers a more attractive and good value alternative to travel in Austria



Transportation

Flights and airports The main airport of Austria is the Vienna international airport. From there you will be able to get a flight to almost every destination in Europe. The airport is located to the east of Vienna in a town called Schwechat. The best way to get to the airport is by car. At the airport you will find sufficient, safe but very expensive parking space. Also a very popular way to get to the airport is by train. Departing from the Viennese Train Station "Wien Mitte" you will find the Airport train called CAT where you are also able to check in directly.

The trip by regular train from Krems to the airport will take you approximately 2 hours and costs about € 17,60 regular and 8,80 with the "Vorteilscard" (as of 2/2010). Please note that you will need to change trains 2 to 3 times on your way to

the airport since there is no direct connection from Krems.

In addition to the main airport in Vienna, the airports in Linz and Salzburg are also worth a look. These smaller airports in the west service mostly low-cost carriers and therefore it is very likely that you can catch a good offer. Both of these airports are quite easy to reach with public transportation.

To the airport in Linz you need to take the train from Krems to St. Pölten. From St. Pölten take a regular train to Linz central station (Linz Hbf). From the central station there is a shuttle service to the airport. The trip will take you approximately 2 ½ hours and will cost you € 23,60 at the regular price and € 11,80 with the "Vorteilscard".

If you decide to take off from Salzburg airport, you will as well need to take a train from Krems to St.Pölten. From there take a regular train to Salzburg central station (Salzburg Hbf). At the central station in Salzburg you need to go to the bus terminal. From there shuttle busses depart for the airport.

The trip will take you approximately 3 to 4 hours and will cost you € 38,70 at the regular price and € 19,40 with the "Vorteilscard".

Transportation

Train

The train will be very likely the most frequent transportation possibility on your travels through Austria. Taking the train to discover Austria is a very popular thing among exchange students. You can enjoy the beautiful landscape. and that the prices are quite moderate. Sometimes you even might be lucky to catch some special offers, such as City trips e.g. to Venice, Florence or Munich for € 29. The train also represents one of the best possibilities to get to airports of Austria.

In general Krems is a good starting point for trips to Prague, Bratislava or Budapest. Of course all interesting cities in Austria such as Vienna, Salzburg, Innsbruck or Graz are also quite easy to reach by train from Krems. To plan your trip, please visit the official site of the Austrian Federal Railways This site is of course also available in English.

Currency

The currency in Austria is the Euro. The Euro is the official currency of 22 European states (16 member states plus 6 EU countries).

It was introduced in 1999 and became the official currency in 2002. Besides the Dollar the Euro is the most important currency in the world.

Banks

Krems itself has many banks. The city houses 9 banks (with 23 branches) of many different locations (also with ATMs) throughout the city.

In Austria paying cash is still very popular. Credit Cards are rarely used and most of the shops usually don't accept them due to high costs for the shop itself. Nevertheless Austrians do use debit cards. Debit cards are plastic cards which are linked to a debit account ("Girokonto") at an Austrian bank and can be used in nearly any shop (also to money at withdraw ATMs). This gives you a better cost control than SfS Insider
Student accounts are usually for free. Furthermore most banks offer special assistance for international students.

paying with a credit card with a higher withdrawal limit.

Paying abroad with those debit cards is usually possible as they support maestro card functions (if you find the "maestro"-symbol on your card it is valid to withdraw money in foreign countries). Therefore you can use them to withdraw money in other countries (additional costs apply here). Nevertheless you should contact your bank advisor for more detailed information as those might vary from bank to bank.



Saving accounts ("Sparbuch") is a very popular way of saving in Austria which offers the customer a safe investment of moderate interest rates. Investment in funds or shares is not as common as in other countries. Saving accounts for exchange students who stay in Austria for I or 2 semesters are not very useful Therefore a checking account is sufficient.

Studying in Krems will quite likely require an account at a local bank. Choosing a bank is not a crucial issue. Most banks are offering equal services also due to minimum regulations from the state. Application processes for getting an account are similar as well. Usually you have to provide the following information:

-A valid Passport-A valid address in Krems

Most banks have no cancelation period for students. Nevertheless overdrawing an account is usually not possible. International money transfers can be made via the IBAN (international banking account number) and BIC (banking identifier code). Those bank wire transfers entail costs which will be covered by the remitter. If the bank of your choice has not communicated you an IBAN and BIC automatically you can contact your bank adviser.



Payment slips / Zahl-scheine

Not relevant in many countries the payment slip or also called "Zahl-schein" survived in Austria. During your stay in Austria you might be confronted with this payment method several times.

You will get this slip for example when you get an invoice for a magazine-subscription. Then

you fill out your name, address, account number as well as the BLZ (bank code) of you and the 2nd party as well as the amount you want to pay. This might be unusual for some international students.

Imagine: Mario Berger wants to transfer €200 (for the rent December) on Florian Rinnofner's bank account. The slip would look like this: The red slip is more imprtant. The blue slip will stay in your posession.

If you have problems with the German on your slip the bank agents are happy to help you with your request.

Fees for letters can range from € 0,65 / 1,40 (EU/Worldwide). Those prices vary according to their size (regular: 50g). Prices for parcels usually include a basic fee (around €12) with additional costs for each kilogram (e.g. 0,75 - 6,50). Those Kilogram-prices vary due to different zones.

The postman always rings twice... but in case you shouldn't be

home by that time he or she leaves you a yellow form which informs you that you received mail, were absent and can pick it up at the nearest post office. This, of course, just happens if you receive a parcel or a registered letter which cannot simply be placed in your post box. By handing the paper in at the Krems office you will receive your mail.

Sending money by mail

is a possibility to receive a larger amount of money. Nevertheless SfS recommends using a wire transfer via an IBAN number to your Austrian account. This results in additional costs but is safer.

The Austrian Post also offers a banking option with its PSK Bank. This is mainly attractive for saving accounts and other saving plans.

Some (more) important information regarding money.

Cost of renting a room

Rooms are a rare thing in Krems. Even though more and more students come to Krems the city resists in building new homes. Therefore apartment prices in Krems are rather high. For a small room you may have to pay between 180 and 300 €. The earlier you look the higher the chance of getting a decent and affordable room with nice flat mates.

Cost of renting an apartment

As rare as rooms are apartments. A 70 m²

apartment can be rented for 550 € +, 33m² for 300 € +. To get a cheap and nice apartment careful and especially early searches are recommended.

A student meal

A meal in the cafeteria "Mensa" is available for around 4 Euros. Meals in restaurants are usually between € 5-7. Students vary in their weekly expenditures. There are ways of spending less and of course there are ways of spending more. If you want to save money it is su-

rely possible to live on around 40 € a week. Nevertheless this just includes food. To be on the safe side calculate around 80 € + if you are used to 3 meals a day.

Additional costs may apply when you go to movies, restaurants and more. You should consider those study and leisure expenditures in your budget.



How to tip

Compared to many other states (like in the USA) waiters get at least a minimum wage. Therefore tips in Austria usually lie around 5% of the total amount. Also many Austrians just round up to the next higher amount (instead of 9.70 € they just round up to 10 €). Where to tip

Tipping in restaurants, bars or in service areas

in general is very common. Tipping after grocery shopping on the other hand is very unusual. Also in other shops (eg. buying shoes, clothing or electronics) giving tip is not common and usually raises "weird looks".

Paying on time

As mentioned before in the Survival Guide Austrians are people who are very into punctuality. This fact can also be seen at the paying discipline. Paying on time is a common practice.

Period of Payment

The period of payments in Austria varies from occasion to occasion. A specific deadline is usually given in the invoice (if applicable) or in any other confirmation. Average and also very popular periods are 2 or 3 weeks.

ÖH Insurance With your membership fee of 17.50 € for the National students union, which is mandatory for all students in Austria including incoming students, a liability and accident insurance by Allianz Elementar Versicherung AG is included, which covers almost all possible accidents and injuries during and in connection with your university activities. For more details, please contact the local students union (ÖH).

Health Insurance Health insurance is generally required by the IMC and the state of Austria Therefore all the students travel to Krems with a fully acknowledged health insu-Nevertheless. rance. especially when you are from outside the EU, an additional private health insurance which covers all aspects your national insurance does not support might be a good solution should you ever have an insurance case. Therefore consulting one of the big insuagencies rance

Austria after you arrive would be an option.

Household Insurance Household insurances are a way of ensuring, that you and your possible flat/roommates are coverd when actions occur like fire, water damage, burglary and more. Austrian insurance agencies also offer special student insurances which usually cover most common causes of household accidents at а low monthly rate.

Insurance

Accident Insurance A temporary accident insurance while you stay in Austria would also be an option.With such insurance you are on the safe side when you get into an accident while traveling in and around Austria (this should be explicitly discussed with the agent). Accident insurances can often be purchased in combination with household insurances at a special student price.

Also most banks offer insurances in cooperation with other large

agencies. Therefore please contact your bank advisor for further information.

If you decide for an additional insurance usually the following data is necessary:

- -Name
- -Date of birth
- -Address

Just to make sure every data is available please take your passport as well as information about your apartment (address/Meldezettel) with you.

Doctors

The Austrian health system as in any other state in the world can be a very complex thing. Nevertheless patients are treated the same no matter where they are from. So if you have an accident (no matter if in the kitchen or on the street) you get the same professional treatment as an Austrian. In case of an accident you do not have to get back home, get your passport or ID. This is not required by Austrian emergency rooms

For EU-citizens costs will be covered through the mandatory health insurance. Therefore the hospitals need your EHIC (European Health Insurance Card). Should you need to stay in the hospital a patient's contribution of 10.78 €/day has to be paid by the patient. Nevertheless some insurances (e.g. some travel insurances) can cover these costs as well.

With Non-EU-Citizens the cost issue gets a little bit more difficult. Even though you might have insurance the Austrian hospitals are required to ask you for payment ahead. In this case you have to pay for your treatment which can be refunded by your health insurance at home.

Hospital

The Hospital of Krems is one of the best in Lower Austria. Important for

students is the outpatient unit (Ambulanz). If you have any medical emergencies, please do not hesitate to go there. Help in the "Ambulanz" will be provided with little administrative efforts. In case of an accident the ambulance will always take you here for emergency treatment. The costs for treatments emergency rooms ("Ambulanzkosten") range from 30 € for basic treatment to more than 400 € in case you need x-rays or more.

The hospital also has a helicopter at its disposal, so that in case of very serious injuries anybody can be taken to one of the big hospitals in Vienna.

It might be a good idea to take a German speaking person with you to the doctor or the hospital. Most me

dical personnel just

have very Basic English skills, a local can also help you with forms and administrative documentation. Ask your buddy or one of the SFS-Team to help you, if you do not feel comfortable with going alone to any medical treatment!

Healthcare

In what medical areas is the hospital in Krems specialized?

Beside the outpatient unit you can also find inter alia specialized treatment for the following medical issues in the hospital:

- Ear, nose and throat
- Internal medicine
- Gynecology
- Urology
- Orthopedics
- Casualty surgery
- Doctors in the Area

If you prefer to consult a doctor, please note that you always have to bring your insurance details with you. In general all things explained above concerning insurance and costs apply here as well.

It is always good to make an appointment before you visit a doctor. Otherwise it might be possible that you have to wait

quite some time. Following you find a list

of doctors for a variety of medical treatments who practice here in Krems. The list is arranged according to the medical fields specialisation.

General Medicine

Just for a brief explanation. The field of "General Medicine" is very common in Austria and is mostly not known to foreigners. General Medicine, in German "Allge-Medizin". we mein understand a Doctor. has а broad knowledge of medicine but is not specialized in a certain field of medicine. We go to this kind of doctors to seek advice and treatment for ordinary illnesses like flu or headaches. If the problem is more serious. this doctor will forward you to a specialist.

If you need any medicine, there are numerous pharmacies in Krems. The Pharmacies are called "Apotheke" in German and always have this sign (see on the right hand side) hanging on the outside. Please note that most pharmacies have lunch breaks and close on Saturdays already at 12 a.m.

and contracts are available from different providers. The big players on the Austrian mobile phone market are A1, Tmobile, Telering, Drei and Orange, further there is a growing number of low budget providers such as Yesss and Bob.

The advantage of a big player is that there is variety of information and support accessible. You can easily receive information about the different offers and contracts through the provider stores, which are situated in the town center or in the Bühl Center. To get overall information about the different providers visit an electronic gadget store such as Hartlauer, Niedermeyer or Media Markt. These shops sell all contracts of the main providers and help you with information. Please be aware that the low budget provider Yesss is only sold via the low budget retailer Hofer.

The decision between a contract with a minimum term of subscription and a prepaid depends highly on your requirements. lust be aware that the minimum term of agreement is normally about 2 years, therefore the purchase price of the mobile phone is lower. In case you choose a long term contract check if your favored provider offers an easy contract exit, in case you leave the country.

Another important point to consider is the roaming fee. Probably you plan to travel through Europe in your spare time, be aware that your Austrian provider will charge roaming fees for the service abroad.

Last but not least ask your buddy for help. Your buddy assists you with additional information and guides you through this decision.

General information

Austria and its inhabitants hold an enormous variety of different cultural, geographical and climatic aspects which are good to know when living here. The following lines will therfore provide you with some general information.

Austria is a landlocked country in the center of Europe. The form of government is a parliamentary republic consisting of nine provinces. The capital city is Vienna. The Federal President is Heinz Fischer and the Federal Chancellor is Werner Faymann, Austria has a surface of about 84.000 km² and 8 Millions inhabitants.

The highest mountain of Austria, called Großglockner, is 3.798 m high. The largest lake, the Neusiedler See in Burgenland, has 315 km². The official language is German, furthermore the Austrian inhabitants speak many different dialects. About 85 % of the area of Austria is agricultural and forest space. Moreover tourism is a very important economic sector.

Climate

Austria has a continental climate. The four seasons (spring, summer, autumn and winter) are each identified by typical temperature and climate characteristics. Austria's climate is characterized by the interaction of the oceanic climate and the continental / pannonian climate. Fastern Austria is affected by cold winters and hot summers with moderate precipitation.



Cultural aspects

Vienna has always been a centre of music. Until today theatres and orchestras as well as the coffeehouse culture are very important for the inhabitants. Regional customs are maintained by regional societies. These customs contain music, dancing, theatre, poetry, carving, embroidery, etc.

Austria's cuisine is a result of the Austro-Hungarian Empire. It is famous for its well-balanced variations of beef and pork and vegetables. There is also the pastries, which comprise particular delicacies such as Sachertorte,

"Krapfen" (doughnuts usually filled with apricot marmalade or custard) and "Strudel" such as "Apfelstrudel" filled with apple and "Topfenstrudel" filled with sweetened sour cream. Please find out more about Austria's cuisine in the "Vienna" chapter.

Furthermore Austria has many different religious feasts like Christmas, Whitsun, Easter or the National holiday. Austrians celebrate these days with special events.

Because of the Alps the Austrians are well known for snow sports. Famous athletes are Hermann Maier, Renate Götschl or Franz Klammer. Also in summer you can do many sports in Austria. Soccer and beach volleyball are also practiced nationwide.

On your trips to these sights you will see that the real sight is not some place or statue, instead the whole country with its beautiful scenery is a big impressive sight.

Salzburg

Old Town of Salzburg
The City of Salzburg is
famous for its old town.
Most people know the
city as well as the birth
place of Mozart. The City

was founded on the ruins of the lost Roman city luvavum. Since 1800 Salzburg has been part of Austria. Before that it was an independent principality ruled by Archbishops. The city attracts many tourists every year. The old town ("Altstadt") is a UNESCO World Heritage site.

The best way to go to Salzburg is by train. From the Krems train station you will need a little more than 3 hours to get there. Take a train from Krems to St. Pölten train station. From the train station in St. Pölten at least every hour a train is departing to Salzburg. A

one way ticket to Salzburg will cost you € 38,7 regular prices and € 19,40 with the "Vorteilscard".

Hohensalzburg Fortress The mightiest fortress of central Europe, a powerful castle sitting in a prominent position. undoubtedly Salzburg's prime attraction and most dominant feature of the city's skyline: "Hohensalzburg Fortress" should not be missed during any visit in Salzburg. The first fortress on the hill was build from 1060 to 1088. Over centuries the castle evolved in to its current appearance.

Birthplace of Mozart

The house in Getreidegasse 9 was the living place of the Mozart family between 1747 and 1773. Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart was born on the 27th of January 1756. The museum in his birthplace now hosts precious relics such as the violin that Mozart used to play when he was a child, his concert violin, his Clavichord, portraits, letters and other memorabilia of the Mozart family.

Mirabell Palace

This Baroque masterpiece was initially built in 1606. Mirabell Palace owes its present unassuming appearance Peter de Nobile, the court's architectural consultant and director of the Vienna School of Architecture. Details such as the edging of the windows, the capitals and stuccowork bear witness to the palace's former splendor. The famous Mirabell Gardens were redesigned around 1690 and completely remodeled. The Mirabell Gardens were opened to the public by Emperor Franz Joseph in 1854. Today they are a horticultural masterpiece and popular backdrop for photographers.

The visit of the palace is free of charge and possible on Monday, Wednesday and Thursday from 8 am till 4 pm, on Tuesday and Friday from 1 pm till 4 pm. If you want to visit the Mirabell Gardens you can do that all year long from 6 am till dusk.

National Park Hohe Tauern

The National Park Hohe Tauern is the biggest of Austria and one of the biggest National Parks in Europe. It covers a total area of 1800 square kilometers and land in the three provinces of Tyrol, Salzburg (biggest share) and Carinthia.

The National Park includes the Central Alps with the highest mountain ranges of Austria, including Mount Großglockner (3798 me-

ters high) and Mount Großvenediger (3666 meters high). The "Großglockner Hochalpenstraße" is an alpine road to near the mountain top and offers spectacular scenery.

The Großglockner Hochalpenstraße is Austria's second most popular attraction after Schönbrunn Palace in Vienna. Beyond this busy part of the park, there are plenty of areas that offer excellent hiking opportunities. The impressive Krimml Waterfalls are another famous sight in the Hohe Tauern.

Upper Austria

City of Gmunden

Gmunden offers everything you expect from a proper Salzkammergut town: Pretty castles, churches and lakefronts with promenades, as well as 19th century villas with wooden porches and balconies. No wonder that Gmunden is popular both with tourists and domestic visitors

Major sights

from Austria, Gmunden and its scenic surroundings were frequently visited by such distinguished guests as Nikolas, the Tsar of Russia and Wilhelm the Emperor of Germany.

Mauthausen

Going to a former concentration camp (KZ) is a sharp contrast to the joyful sightseeing that you might do elsewhere in Austria, Mauthausen was one of the most notorious concentration camps in the Third Reich. Only a few kilometers from Linz, Mauthausen provides an opportunity to dive from the peaks of Baroque culture to the lowest point mankind has been to.

Lower Austria

Wachau Valley

The Wachau follows the Danube for 33 kilometers from Melk to Krems and reaches into the side-valleys of the Wachauer Gräben. The region is a UNESCO World Cultural Heritage Site, due to its stunning baroque architecture, atmospheric towns, vineyards and orchards.

The Abbey of Melk If there was any such thing as a "National Abbey", the glorious Benedictine monastery of Melk would be the one of Austria. In the heart of the Wachau region in Lower Austria, Melk was the centre of the medieval county of Austria. As an intellectual centre, Melk's Annals and the ..Breve chronicon" from the 12th century are important scriptures for Austrian history.

Styria

Old Town of Graz

When the Habsburgs concentrated their fight against protestants around 1600, the formally widely protestant Graz became a centre of their interest. This led to the erection of several impressive, Catholic buildings: a University was founded, a Catholic mausoleum built and the Minoriten Church meant to show the dominance of Catholic believes.

Clocktower

The clockworks in the tower have struck the hours accurately since 1712. Standing at the romantic landmark of Graz you could be forgetting time The fortified medieval tower got its present shape around 1560 and its characteristic wooden gallery as a fire station.

Tyrol

City of Innsbruck Innshruck has a late medieval city centre. In the 15th century, it was made a "Residenzstadt", a centre for representation and administration. by Emperor Maximilian I. He built a balcony with a golden roof called "Goldenes Dachl", which is still the main attraction of the town. Explore the narrow alleys and ancient courts for a while. go down to the river and the triumph arch ("Triumphbogen") that Em-

press Maria Theresia built in 1655. Austria ☐s "mother of the nation" was very fond of Innsbruck.

Goldenes Dachl

The Golden Roof is one of the most characteristic landmarks in Innsbruck. The Golden Roof actually is the threestory balcony on the central plaza at the heart of the Old Town. The late Gothic oriels are capped with 2,738 gold-plated copper tiles. It was constructed for Emperor Maximilian I to serve as a royal box where he could sit in luxury and enjoy tournaments in the square below.

City of Kufstein
Of the many pretty
towns that you will find
nestled in the Tyrolean

Alps, Kufstein is among the prettiest. The most distinguished spots are concentrated in town centre, so our sightseeing tour is best enjoyed through a general stroll around the medieval alleys. The main square is called "Unterer Stadtplatz" and nearby you will find the Dreifaltigkeitskirche or "Church of the Holy Trinity". Its base was built in Gothic style, but it was seriously extended several times since the initial construction. Today, it unites various architectural styles. Alternatively, you can hike straight up to the main attraction: The 13th century (extensively remodeled in the 16th century) fortress of Kufstein is among the most impressive military buildings of Austria



It is always good to know the legal rules of the country that one lives in. Here are some important facts that you should consider.

Alcohol

Drinking alcohol in Austria is partially legal from the age of 16. Buying and drinking "light" liquids like beer and wine is allowed. Ensuring identification is a requirement for every shop which sells alcohol. Hard drinks like Vodka (this includes also Alcopops) are legal from the age of 18.

Smoking

Buying and smoking cigarettes is legal from the age of 16. Smoking in bars and restaurants is basically forbidden. Nevertheless the law which is less strict than in other European countries the smoking ad offers many possibilities for owners to get around the smoking regulations. Therefore smoking in most bars is still allowed. Also many discos allow smoking.

You can buy cigarettes in tobacconist's, at every petrol station and at cigarette machines. At cigarette machines you can pay with coins and notes, but you need a debit card "Maestro" (prove that you are 16 years old).

Drugs

Drugs are illegal in Austria and are forbidden by law. Regardless your home country or status as international student everyone who gets caught with illegal substances will be treated equally according to the Austrian law.

SfS Insider Don't forget your ID. Shops which sell alcohol or cigarettes are required to ask for some kind of identification. The IMC-Student-ID helps you here and also gets you some benefits at some occasions (e.g. cinema).



SfS Insider

Vandalism is strictly pursued by Austrian police and will be dealt with according to the Austrian law no matter your nationality.

Cultural Rules/Informal Rules

Greeting

Greeting in Austria is very common and is usually used more often than in other states. Therefore don't be surprised to get greeted by people you have never seen before even in elevators.

Formality / Informality
Austrians, especially
elder Austrians are very
sensitive about how you
talk to them. German itself has 2 forms of
"you". The formal "Sie"
which you usually use
when you first meet or
if the counterpart didn't
offer you the "Du"-

word yet. "Du" is the second "You" and is used for friends or people you already know very well.

Titles

Titles in Austria are a very strange subject. Young Austrians care less and less about them Nevertheless older Austrians (40+) and especially those who have honorary titles or are active in the government love and furthermore request to be greeted with their official title. So never forget to greet a "Bundesrat", "Bürgermeister" or a Doctor by her/his title.

Talking with Austrians In nearly every culture there are some things you better not talk about. Austrians don't like to talk about salaries and politics. The topic of salary is usually considered to be rather personal and Austrians feel uncomfortable talking about it. Politics itself is not taboo as long as you don't ask how Austrians vote Austrians consider preference of parties also rather personal and don't want to be confronted with it in a discussion.

Shopping/Office Hours

Shopping hours are also different than in some other countries. Many shops close between noon and 2pm for lunch. Also most of them close at 6 pm while most offices already call it a day at 5 pm. Banks are not open on weekends. Nevertheless Saturday is the major shopping day of the week. Sundays are a "national treasure". Therefore just restaurants, bars or museums open on Sundays.

Floors

Don't be confused when an Austrian meets up with you at the 2nd floor of the Piaristengasse. In Austria unlike in some other countries the 2nd floor is actually

the 3rd floor. Why? Because Austrians have a "Ground Floor" the so called "Erdgeschoss" which is the 1st floor of every building. The "Austrian" 1st floor is the floor above the "Ground floor" – therefore the 2nd floor.

Electricity

Austria's electronic products are made for 220-volt AC, 50HZ, which is pretty common for Europe. Nevertheless Austria uses plug-ins which might not fit for you cable in your hometown. Therefore we recommend buying adapters for your laptops or other devices you might want to take with you.

Credit Cards

Credit Cards are widely accepted in stores in Austria. Please look for the typical signs (e.g. VISA, MasterCard, ...) or ask the cashier. In bars and restaurants it is a little bit more difficult. Please ask before your meal if you can pay with Credit Card, Please also always control your deduction. If you need to inactivate your card. please have a look at "Important chapter phone numbers", where you can find your emergency number.

Krems an der Donau is the eastern gateway to the Wachau Valley, one of Europe's loveliest river landscapes. It is also one of the oldest cities of the country. This history dating back more than a thousand years is evident everywhere - in the streets and squares, in the old monasteries and churches, in the town houses and fortifications.

The historical center of Krems is one of the most beautiful in Europe. Over the centuries, builders and architects have created a unique cityscape that has been cared for and preserved. These efforts

have not gone unnoticed In 1975 Krems was singled out as a .. Model City for Historical Preservation" and in 2000 it was added to the UNESCO World Heritage List. With all this history, you might think that the city is dominated by the past. In reality, Krems is very open to modern life: Contemporary art and culture play an important role here, adding variety and energy to public areas throughout the city.



Steinertor

This gate is the only remaining of the four medieval city gates. The surface illustrates a variety of inscriptions as well as the Austrian double eagle and the red-white-red shield Daily at II a.m. and 4 p.m. the well known chime starts to play. The Steiner gate is the most important sight in Krems and is used because of its position as a meeting point for students

Göglhaus

This house is special because of its main entrance, the unique gothic chapel bay and mural paintings.

Jüdischer Friedhof (Jewish cemetery)

Located along the Wienerstraße East of the city the Jewish ceme-

tery is an impressive sight, which represents the importance of the Jewish community in Krems before World War II.

Kloster Und

The monastery Und has been run by the Capuchin monks in the past and still offers a variety of frescos for its visitors. Today the monastery is an event location as well as a restaurant and tourist information centre.

Piaristenkirche

The Piarist church was mentioned the first time in 1284. The baroque interior contains an amazing amount of artworks by the most important Austrian painters of this time.

Pulverturm

This tower was built in 1477 and used for mili-

tary purpose. Regarding its characteristic position the tower is a well known sight of Krems.

The most important examples of modern architecture in Krems are Campus Krems and the Austrian film gallery on the premises of the former Austrian tobacco manufactory as well as the Art Hall and the cartoon museum.

Celebrations, markets and feasts

Starnight Club

This is a well known event series in and around Krems. Starnight Club (SNC) is always organized with a different theme / motto. "Alles Marille..."

This feast is organized in order to celebrate the harvest of the apricots. The feast is always taking place in mid July. During the day festivity takes place in the city center of Krems. From 5 p.m. on the festivity continues at the ship landing pier at Stein.

"Wachauer Volks Fest"

This event is a mixture of a fair and a traditional Austrian beerfest. It is

the biggest of its kind in Lower Austria and takes place in August and September every second year. In the colloquial language of Krems this feast is called "Ausstellung". Each year this event is organised around a special topic.

"Open Air Kino"

This is the open air version of the "Kino im Kesselhaus" at the Campus. From the end of June till mid July a great variety of cultural sophisticated movies are shown. Some films are presented in the original version. The shows take place from Wednesday to Saturday at 09:30 pm.

"Leopoldimarkt Stein"

Fun sports

Besides unique soils and ideal climatic conditions, the quality of wine here is attributable first and foremost to the work in the vineyards. Krems winemakers set great store by ecological, natural and environmentally friendly methods of production..

Wine

Lovers of good wine enjoy ready access to the cellars of Krems winemakers, the Buschenschenken (another name for the Heurigen wine taverns of eastern Austria) and the wine tasting shops run by top quality wineries, and of course, to the city's own wine estate.

White wines

Krems is a typical white wine region. Approximately 85% of the 1050 hectares of vineyards are planted with white grapes. Grüner Veltliner is the frontrunner with a share of 55%, followed by Riesling (25%), Müller Thurgau (10%) and

then Neuburger, Weissburgunder and Chardonnay.

Grüner Veltliner Peppery and spicy, generally dry.

It accounts for one third of total vineyard plantings in Austria, making it the most widespread variety in the country.

Riesling Elegant nose, fine nuances, racy. In good wine years, the

In good wine years, the noble Riesling from Austria's top vineyards is undisputedly one of the world's best representatives of this classic variety.

Red wines

About 15% of all vineyards are planted with red varieties. The main one, accounting for more than 50% of the total, is Blauer Zweigelt, followed by Blauer Portugieser and Blauer Burgunder.
